Step Three

Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.

In my opinion, taking step three is like making a decision to go back to school and earn a degree. When the work has begun, one realizes how much there is to learn about the impacts of the decision that was made. While I was in school, I was shown how much there was to learn about things I didn't even know existed. When I made the decision to earn my degree I couldn't have predicted or understood what going to college meant all I could do was trust the process, and I have had a similar experience in taking step three.

I took step three for the first time when I called the Minneapolis Intergroup Central Office, and I took step three again when I called back a week later because I had hung up the first time. The third time I took step three was when I decided not to go out and drink the weekend I got out of detox. The fourth time I took step three was when I made a decision to go to a meeting for the first time (see the process?).

I continue to gratefully (grudgingly) take step three, because I am as stubborn as a mule, and I forgetfully live my life wrongly convinced that my intelligence alone will be able to successfully guide me through my life. As a result, I frequently take the wrong path, and when I re-take step three I let God, as I understand it, redirect me. I take step three every time I walk into a meeting, pick up the phone to call my sponsor, get down on my knees to pray, or call a newcomer. There are also times when I find it necessary to put stipulations on my Higher Power, during these times I try to read the chapter "We Agnostics" in the Big Book.

In the beginning of my recovery, step three was staying sober. As I continue to (re)work the steps of Alcoholics Anonymous, I am able to (with the help of a sponsor) apply the meaning of step three to my life appropriately, whether it's to a relationship, finances, or any other life "problem". There are many things this step has taught me, and most of them came from giving away the things I thought I needed to hold on to the hardest.

What are Service Committees?

A.A. service committees work to ensure the A.A. message reaches people who may need it. Many alcoholics first hear A.A.'s message of hope thanks to the work of the volunteers on these committees.

What are some of the different Service Committees?

Archives Committees

Archives committees work to collect, preserve and share the history of A.A.

Corrections Committees

Corrections committees work to carry the A.A. message of recovery to incarcerated alcoholics.

Accessibilities Committees

Accessibilities Committees serve to assist those who have significant barriers that must be overcome to insure full participation in A.A.



Treatment Committees

Treatment committees work to carry the A.A. message into treatment settings where there may be suffering alcoholics.

<u>Cooperation with the Professional Community</u> (C.P.C.) Committees

C.P.C. committees work to inform professionals who are likely to come into contact with problem drinkers about A.A.

Remote Communities Committees

Remote Communities committees work to bring A.A. to communities that are difficult to reach because of geography, language or culture.

Public Information Committees

Public Information committees work to convey A.A. information to the general public.

The Seventh Tradition states:

"Every A.A. group ought to
be fully self-supporting,
declining outside
contributions." While
contributions cover each
group's rent and other
expenses, the Seventh
Tradition is essential
at every level of A.A. service.

It is both a privilege and a responsibility for groups and members to ensure that not only their group, but also their intergroup/central office, local services, district, area, and the General Service Office remain
