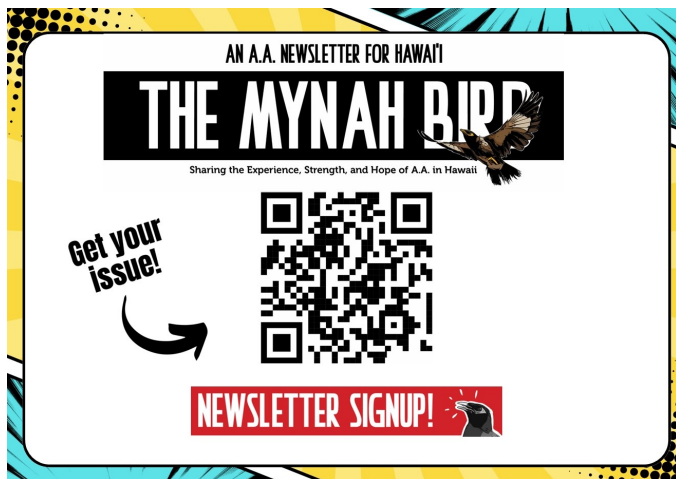

TRADITION FIVE:

*"Each group has but one primary purpose—
to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers."*

You know, our singleness of purpose is the one unifying principle ensuring our self-preservation.

All human beings undergo some form of suffering; we are not especially unique as alcoholics. What is unique is our gratefulness for "the way out" that has been discovered for us. In my own experience, recovery in AA can be distilled into two solutions. In one hand, I firmly grasp the paradox of abstinence — the daily practice of staying stopped. In the other, I loosely hold a spiritual life grounded in humility, earnest seeking, and the continual reinforcement of a beginner's mind. Sobriety and spirituality: I cannot have one without the other. I must join my hands.

Yet the chief element in the survival of both myself and the fellowship is the spearhead quality of passing it on to the next alcoholic. In the 12x12, it is called our "one high mission." The spiritual importance of a unified purpose is that the transmission of the original miracle remains resolute and unfettered. We are morally obligated to stick to the business of carrying sobriety alone.

Our individual homages to sobrietas may prevail in the outside world only if we exercise restraint within and maintain the integrity of this tradition and the others. A threefold dynamic exists: steadfast obedience to sobriety, abiding within a spiritual life, and the motion of love made visible through passing it on. Like anything else, our work is defined by force and direction. Distance made good cannot afford the parasitic drains of veering off course.

Taking Inventory After the Storm

There is something about a storm on Maui that quiets all illusion of control. The brown floodwaters move across the land, and the mind immediately wants to judge what it sees — damage, disorder, loss. It wants to call the moment ugly. It wants to forget that what is most true is often hidden beneath the surface of what appears. But when I become still, when I return to the breath, when I let myself be fully here, I can feel something deeper than what my eyes first tell me.

Maui is still here.

Beneath the brown water, beneath the mud and debris, beneath the heaviness of the storm, the beauty of this island remains untouched. The sacredness is still here. The mana is still here. The mountains still keep watch. The ocean still breathes its ancient rhythm. The heart of the island has not been washed away. It is only, for a moment, concealed.

Presence makes room for all of it.

It makes room for sorrow without letting sorrow become the whole story. It makes room for the shock of what has been disturbed, while also trusting what is quietly alive underneath. The storm is real. The flooding is real. But so is the life beneath it. So is the healing already beginning in ways I cannot yet fully see. And I think about Step Four — that searching and fearless look at what is true. Not to create shame, but to clear away illusion. To see where fear lives. To see where resentment tries to take hold. To notice where I want life to look different than it does right now. The flood outside can stir the flood within. It can reveal the places in me that still cling, still resist, still want to control what was never mine to control.

Aloha asks me to meet even that with honesty and love.

Not by pretending everything is fine. Not by turning away from pain. But by staying soft enough to let truth rise. Step Four teaches me that healing begins when I stop hiding from what is there. And aloha reminds me that I can look gently, with compassion, without condemning myself or the world. I can take inventory of my fear and still remain in love. I can see the mud clearly and still trust the life beneath it.

And this island knows how to return.

After the storm, the water will recede. The sun will come through again. And from the drenched earth, the green will rise — lush, vibrant, unmistakably alive. The foliage that follows the storm carries its own kind of wisdom. It does not fight what came before it. It simply grows. It receives what the storm has given and transforms it into life.

There is comfort in that.

What looks overwhelmed today may become even more alive tomorrow. What seems buried may still be beautiful. What appears lost may simply be waiting for the right moment to reemerge. So I sit with Maui today as she is — flooded, brown, shaken, sacred. I sit with the beauty that is visible and the beauty that is hidden. I sit with a willingness to look honestly at my own heart, to take inventory without fear, and to let love have the final word. I sit with trust in the green that will come after. And I remember that beneath all passing forms, beneath every storm, love remains.

STEP FIVE:

"Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs."

I have been in Alcoholics Anonymous for around 35 years, sober 17 years ... so you do the math. My journey in recovery has included 3 or 4 different home groups, 5 or 6 sponsors, and about as many times doing a 5th step.

My very first time doing the steps was with my sponsor Linda - who I picked only because she had been sober for over 2 years, per the direction of the treatment program I was just released from. Treatment centers were big business, insurance was paying well for inpatient treatment, and my home group had a great deal of members who had been through a "spin dry" and, in hindsight, put their own spin on the steps. I was reading the big book, but my sponsor was involved with a group who believed in writing an autobiography as our 4th step, so when I did my 5th step with my sponsor I started as young as I could remember and went all the way to the present ... I'm sure a mind-numbing way to spend an evening for my sponsor. I don't recall any input from her, any reflection about my part - which I now know is a HUGE part of my 5th step. I relapsed shortly after, and in talking with the bleeding deacons of the group they asked how long my 4th step was, how old I was, did some special recovery math and decided I hadn't been honest enough, hadn't written enough.

I moved on to different sponsors, did the steps directly out of the big book, out of the 12 x 12, and even with a group who had a work sheet for each step. I truly believed I was doing the best I could at the time and I did stay sober for 10 years at one point.

Sharing my 5th step with women I trusted, and being as honest as I could, changed my life. I'm grateful for each sponsor I had the privilege of working with and for every time I did the steps in any fashion. I've learned from my experience that doing a 5th step is best done after a thorough and honest 4th step, written as if no one is ever going to see it but you, and sharing with someone who is trusted, understanding, and is willing to go on the journey with you.

I recently did a 5th step with my current sponsor, and just like most things in my life, I thought I knew it all. I did not expect to learn anything new about myself or gain any insights on my behavior because it was stuff that was over 15 years ago. I've been to therapy around it, sat in groups, journaled, read books, and discussed it ad-nauseam with friends, so doing a 5th step with my sponsor (no matter how amazing she is) I didn't expect any 'ah-ha' moments. Boy was I wrong! I learned one more time that sharing with a woman I trust, who is sober, has a sponsor, and uses her sponsor can still be life changing. I had written my 4th step with honesty, as if no one but me would read it, and once again was blessed with the absolute power and magic of this program.

The time spent doing my 5th step brought an incredible amount of clarity. This was a result of her identifying with me, seeing my part, understanding the what/why I did what I did, and finding my way to forgiveness was incredibly powerful. It really is simple ... work the steps, all 12 in order, keep your side of the street clean, and you will create a life beyond your wildest dreams.

April 11, 2026

CALL TO ORDER: 6:00 pm by Chair – Mark

Opened with Serenity Prayer and A.A. Preamble. 4th Tradition share by Jody (GSR – Sober Wahine.)

District/Area reps: Elijah – Alt DCM, District 5; Tim – DCM – No Ka Oi District 5; Pat – Alt DCM – Sober & Crazy; Jody – GSR – Sober Wahine; Members: Michael

APPROVAL OF PRIOR MONTH’S MEETING MINUTES: Motion/Second by Deborah (Kihei Morning Serenity) and Carl (Kihei Beach Grp) and passed to accept the 3/21 minutes.

INTERGROUP REPRESENTATIVE GROUP REPORTS:

- Francois – Saturday Speakers: There have been many newcomers lately.
- Bonnie – Sisters in Sobriety: Good attendance, with a mix of new/old sobriety; splits made this past month. 10 Big Books went missing from meeting place.
- Terry – A New Awakening: About ten people attend on average, positions filled. All is going well.
- Livit – Women’s AA Way of Life: All is going well; Alt-IG and Alt-GSR positions open; GSR travel is cutting into group’s ability to make splits – group is considering ways to reduce outgo for GSR travel.
- Karen – Sober & Crazy: Lots of court card attendees with sincere shares, along with many longtimers; Literature position may be coming open, all others filled.
- Deborah -- Kihei Morning Serenity: Several positions remain open for in-person and Zoom meetings.
- Bill – Maui Sunset: All is well, still 7 days/wk.
- Kevin M – Maui Strong (reporting for Wally): The group has moved to War Memorial Stadium parking lot on the tennis court side, due to the lights being turned off at their previous location. Still Friday at 7 pm.
- Mike – Friday Night young People: The group meets at the Bridge Club in Kihei, with attendance up/down. GSR, IGR, Secty, Treas positions filled, but some open.
- Anne – Upcountry Sunrise: New to the position, nothing to report at this time.
- Trish – TTOSBT Zoom: Meets 6 days/wk on Zoom, 7:30 am. Changed sobriety requirement to 3 months (was 6 mos) to help fill positions.
- Jody (GSR) -- Sober Wahine: All positions filled. Been working on agenda items for Inform the Delegate.
- Carl–Kihei Beach Group: Group meets on grass of Kam III, 9 am Sundays. Maui County will soon restrict parking to residents only until 10 am, so they’re trying to figure out how to deal with that.
- Amy–High in the Sky: Coffee maker position is open. All is well.
- Jack–To Thine Own Self Be True: Group needs a GSR and permanent IG Rep. Asked about using Venmo for splits to GSO, IG, etc.; it was suggested by others that someone in the group use their personal Venmo acct for 7th Tradition.

OFFICE MANAGER’S REPORT – Michelle (Interim CO Mgr):

- Maui Intergroup is accepting resumes for the position of Central Office Manager. The qualifications and job requirements are posted on the AA Maui website. People interested in the position can email their cover letter and resume to info@aamaui.org. Prior to coming to Central Office, members should check the website and call the office first to make sure someone is here at the office.
- Although Maui Intergroup has a PayPal account, we prefer that groups pay their 7th Tradition splits to Intergroup via cash or check. This avoids the 2-3% PayPal service fee. The PayPal account is mostly intended for individual

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member contributions. There was a brief discussion of how PayPal works vs. Venmo.

- Volunteers are needed on Wednesdays (10 am – 1 pm) to work at Central Office, answering phones and providing A.A. literature as needed to groups. Volunteers also needed Mon-Fri 1 pm to 10 am the next morning to answer phone calls remotely. Phone rarely rings at night, during the day it's often someone asking for directions to a mtg. Back-up volunteers also needed for all Central Office shifts to cover for vacations, illness, etc.
- Trish (TTOSBT Zoom) volunteered to write an article on Step 5 for the Serenity Gazette. Elijah (Alt DCM, No Ka Oi) will write an article on Tradition 5.

HAWAII AREA/MAUI DISTRICT/STANDING SERVICE COMMITTEE REPORTS: Elijah (Alt DCM, District 5) deferred to District 5 DCM Tim. Tim reports that District 5 needs help with serving meals for the Inform the Delegate Assembly starting 8 am on April 18-19 at Hannibal Tavares Community Center in Pukalani. Please show up to help in any way you can. Several District 5 meetings will be dropped from the GSO meeting app unless someone claims them, as GSO requires a contact:

TREASURER'S REPORT- Kevin: See report for month of April.

- We now have a checking and a savings account at Bank of Hawaii, with the Central Pacific Bank savings acct closed.
Motion/Second by Jack (TTOSBT) and Livit (Women's AA Way of Life) and passed to accept the Treasurer's Report.

STEERING COMMITTEE CHAIR REPORT – Mark:

- We signed, notarized and returned the Disclaimer Notice to the Trustee of Sylvia W's estate, confirming that Maui AA Intergroup disclaims all funds over and above the \$12,500 already received in December 2025. The remainder of the \$600,000 bequest will be split evenly among the other nonprofits named in Sylvia's will.
- We need a host group for Founders Day – please take back to your groups.
- We transferred \$5,500 from checking to savings to achieve a prudent reserve of six months of expenses.
- We need volunteers, especially for phones outside of office hours.

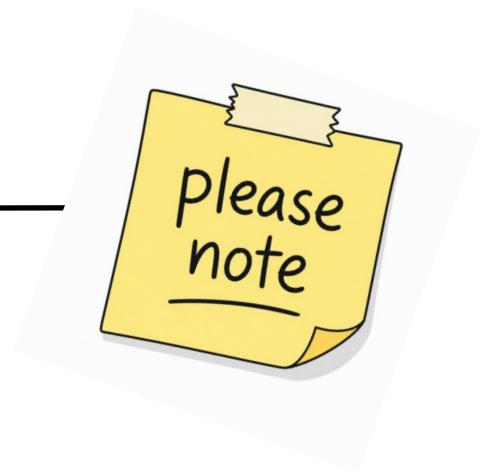
