All respect to those for whom it's not a fit. Within that is the beauty of the WE.

Step Eight: “Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.”

Step Eight is where the healing deepens—not just for ourselves, but for those we’ve hurt along the way. After gaining clarity in earlier steps, this is a moment of courage and honesty. We sit down, pen in hand, and take a fearless look at the past. The goal is not to dwell in shame, but to begin restoring broken connections and releasing the emotional weight we carry.

Making a list of those we’ve harmed isn’t about blaming ourselves for everything, nor is it about rushing to fix things. It’s about becoming willing—willing to make amends, willing to grow, and willing to practice humility. This willingness is what prepares us for the real action in Step Nine.

Step Eight teaches us that healing relationships begins with truth and willingness. It’s a sacred inventory of accountability and grace.

Tradition Eight: “Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.”

Tradition Eight reminds us that A.A. is a fellowship, not a business. The heart of our program—one alcoholic helping another—is always given freely. Sponsorship, Twelfth Step work, and meeting service are shared out of love, not for a paycheck. This protects the spiritual foundation of A.A., where no one is above or below another, and recovery is offered without price.

At the same time, Tradition Eight makes space for practicality. While our message is always carried by volunteers, some roles—like answering phones at Central Office or managing literature orders—require consistency and skill. In these cases, A.A. may hire “special workers” to help carry out essential tasks. These workers are not performing Twelfth Step work—they are supporting it.

In short, this Tradition keeps our spiritual work sacred and our service structure functional. It’s a balance of heart and hands, ensuring that A.A. remains freely given, while still getting the work done.

Concept Eight: The Trustees are the principal planners and administrators of overall policy and finance. They have custodial oversight, and they delegate direct management to their service boards and committees.

Concept Eight helps define how A.A. is organized at the service level. While the Trustees of the General Service Board are entrusted with the overall direction and financial health of A.A. as a whole, they aren’t expected to manage every detail themselves. Instead, they serve as guardians—overseeing and guiding—while delegating day-to-day tasks to trusted committees, boards, and workers.

This Concept allows for both responsibility and efficiency. The Trustees stay focused on long-term planning, safeguarding the Fellowship’s principles, and ensuring accountability. Meanwhile, A.A.’s service arms—like G.S.O. (General Service Office) or A.A. Grapevine, Inc.—handle operations, publications, and communication with the wider Fellowship.

Concept Eight teaches us about trust, structure, and teamwork. Just like in recovery, we each have a part to play. When everyone knows their role and works in harmony, we can effectively carry the message to alcoholics everywhere.

Dear A.A. Friends,


I want to take this opportunity to express my deep gratitude to all who attended and supported the International Convention which took place in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, earlier this month. More than 34,000 members and guests from over 90 countries were present to celebrate the 90th Anniversary of our Fellowship. It truly was an extraordinary gathering of love and service! Being with tens of thousands of A.A. members from around the world was a powerful reminder of the depth and reach of our Fellowship—and the joy that comes from sharing our sobriety one day at a time.

In my last communication, I mentioned that operations on the 8th and 11th floors at the General Service Office will be consolidated to the 11th floor only. This will not only realize a savings in occupancy costs but also allow for better collaboration and effectiveness among all departments and services we provide. This consolidation will require modifications to our 11th floor office space to accommodate our Publishing and Communication Services Departments, which currently are on the 8th floor.

Over the last several months, we have spent considerable time and effort planning for the retrofit of our space. In order to keep associated costs and disruption to services to a minimum, the office will be operating remotely beginning Monday, August 11, and will do so for the duration of the project, which is expected to be about 10-12 weeks. Please know that our mail and shipping operation and our phones will be operational throughout. Unfortunately, visiting the office during this time will not be possible, but GSO tours will resume when the project is completed. For updates during this period, please check aa.org, aagrapevine.org, the Meeting Guide App, as well as the Grapevine and La Vina apps.

We recognize that many of you may be planning visits to GSO, and we sincerely apologize for any inconvenience this may cause. We look forward to welcoming you back to a refreshed and revitalized GSO this fall. Thank you for your patience and understanding during this project.


