"Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, every reminding us to place principles before personalities."



Concept 12 keeps us anchored in spiritual principles as we serve at every level. It reminds us to protect our fellowship from power struggles and to place principles above personalities — ensuring the message remains clear and accessible for future generations.

As we close the year, we celebrate the miracles born from service, humility, and unity — continuing to show up for each other, one day at a time. Let's carry that light into the New Year.



Having had....

Recently, driving home from Dawn Patrol one morning, I looked up and saw the sky split in two—one side heavy with clouds, the other opening into a deep, impossible Maui blue. And something in me recognized the moment instantly. It felt like Step 12 made visible right above my head.

As I watched the edge where the storm met the light, I felt that familiar truth of spiritual awakening rise up in me again—quiet, steady, without fanfare. It wasn't that the world suddenly changed; it was that *I* was able to see it differently. Dawn Patrol always softens me, brings me back into humility and honesty, and this sky felt like a reflection of that inner shift.

One of my teachers would say that awakening is really just remembering—returning to what I've always been beneath the fear and the old stories. And on that drive home, I could feel that remembering happening inside me. The heavy clouds felt like the weight I used to carry. The clear blue felt like the grace that's been carrying me. And the way they met without conflict reminded me that both are part of my path.

Step 12 calls us to bring this awakening into the world, to carry the message – not by preaching, but by being present in a way that helps someone else see their own blue sky through the clouds. I'm learning that service isn't loud. It's steady, like that line of light running across the top of the mountain.

As I drove, I felt grateful for Maui—how the island keeps showing me what awakening looks like in nature: clouds moving, light shifting, beauty arriving in its own time. And I felt grateful for the path I'm on, for the fellowship of Dawn Patrol, for the chance to show up again and again with a clearer heart.

That morning, the sky whispered to me:
This is the path. Keep going. Keep carrying it forward

Tradition Twelve:

Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

8. In light of increased awareness of alcoholism and AA's program of recovery among the general public, why is the principle of anonymity still important?
9. Am I mindful to respect the anonymity of other AA members who may work in my place of employment or my industry? How about AA members who live in my area or neighborhood?
10. What does "principles before personalities" mean to me?

CONCEPT 12: Stewardship, Balance, and Spiritual Principles

This is a member's perspective, shared for reflection. It does not constitute an official position of Maui Intergroup or Central Office.

Concept Twelve teaches us that AA's service structure is safest when grounded in spiritual principles.

Through the Six Warranties, we are guided toward prudence, humility, transparency, balance, and unity—especially in decisions involving finances or long-term resources.

Some members may wonder whether accepting a large bequest fits within these principles. Concept Twelve reminds us that the key question is not the size of the gift, but the spirit in which it is received and managed. AA's principles don't ask us to refuse support; they simply remind us to handle the resources we receive with balance and spiritual intention.


When a bequest is freely given, carries no conditions, and is handled through informed group conscience, accepting it can be entirely consistent with the Warranties. The principles encourage us to maintain prudence without avoiding reasonable support, avoid perilous wealth rather than all resources, practice transparent and democratic decision-making, and keep humility and AA's primary purpose at the center.

Receiving a bequest does not place AA in a position of power or material excess when funds are used responsibly. Instead, it can simply become another tool that allows us to better serve the still-suffering alcoholic.

Concept Twelve does not forbid resources; it teaches us how to steward them with balance and spiritual clarity. Handled thoughtfully, accepting a bequest can remain fully aligned with AA's spiritual principles.

The Six Warranties Concept 12



Reprinted from The Twelve Concepts for World Service Illustrated; P-8

Warranty One:

That the Conference shall never become the seat of perilous wealth or power.

Warranty Two:

That sufficient operating funds, plus an ample reserve, be its prudent financial principle.

Warranty Three:

That it place none of its members in a position of unqualified authority over others.

Warranty Four:

That it reach all important decisions by discussion, vote, and, whenever possible, by substantial unanimity.

Warranty Five:

That its actions never be personally punitive nor an incitement to public controversy.

Warranty Six:

That it never perform acts of government, and that, like the Society it serves, it always remain democratic in thought and action.

What Is a Service Dog?

A service dog is not a pet. Service dogs are trained to perform specific tasks that assist a person with a disability.

Examples include:

- Alerting to medical conditions
- Guiding someone with visual impairment
- Grounding or interrupting panic episodes
 - Mobility assistance
- Support for neurological conditions

Under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), trained service dogs are legally permitted in public places, including AA meetings.

Why Service Dogs Are Important in AA

Some AA members cannot safely attend meetings without the assistance of their service dog.

Their dog may help them:

- Manage medical symptoms
- Reduce the risk of unsafe health events
 - Maintain emotional stability
- Participate fully in sharing and listening
- Be physically able to sit in the room

A service dog allows these members to show up, stay, and recover—which is the purpose of AA.

AA Principles That Support This

Tradition Three: “The only requirement for AA membership is a desire to stop drinking.”

This tradition reminds us that anyone who wants sobriety should have access to meetings, including people who require a service dog for their safety or functioning.

Tradition One: “Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon AA unity.”

Welcoming members who need service dogs maintains unity and ensures AA continues to be a refuge for all who suffer from alcoholism.

Our Shared Goal

AA is a place where the sick and suffering come for hope and healing.

Welcoming members who rely on service dogs helps keep our meetings:

- Inclusive
- Safe
- Respectful
- In line with AA traditions

Together, we help each other recover. That includes making space for every member—and their necessary medical support

Twelve Tips on Keeping Your Holiday Season Sober and Joyous

Holiday parties without liquid spirits may still seem a dreary prospect to new A.A.s. But many of us have enjoyed the happiest holidays of our lives sober—an idea we would never have dreamed of, wanted, or believed possible when drinking. Here are some tips for having an all-round ball without a drop of alcohol.



1 *Line up extra A.A. activities for the holiday season.* Arrange to take newcomers to meetings, answer the phones at a clubhouse or central office, speak, help with dishes, or visit the alcoholic ward at a hospital.



2 *Be host to A.A. friends, especially newcomers.* If you don't have a place where you can throw a formal party, take one person to a diner and spring for the coffee.



3 *Keep your A.A. telephone list with you all the time.* If a drinking urge or panic comes—postpone everything else until you've called an A.A.



4 *Find out about the special holiday parties, meetings, or other celebrations*

given by groups in your area, and go. If you're timid, take someone newer than you are.



5 *Skip any drinking occasion you are nervous about.* Remember how clever you were at excuses when drinking? Now put the talent to good use. No office party is as important as saving your life.



6 *If you have to go to a drinking party and can't take an A.A. with you, keep some candy handy.*



7 *Don't think you have to stay late.* Plan in advance an "important date" you have to keep.



8 *Worship in your own way.*



9 *Don't sit around brooding.* Catch up on those books, museums, walks, and letters.



10 *Don't start now getting worked up about all those holiday temptations.* Remember—"one day at a time."



11 *Enjoy the true beauty of holiday love and joy.* Maybe you cannot give material gifts—but this year, you can give love.



12 *"Having had a . . ." No need to spell out the Twelfth Step here, since you already know it.*
