## **Step Two: "Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity."**

Of course, I never thought I lost my sanity. Drinking or not drinking, I pretty much reacted logically. I had a job and relationships. I hadn't been arrested. Not insanity, just liked to party. I worked hard and liked to party hard.

But looking back, I know that the things I did, which perhaps were still within the confines of the law mostly, were self-destructive. And most poor behaviors that did not involve punishment, were mostly about not getting caught, yet.

So I found AA and after truly becoming aware that I was powerless over alcohol in Step One, I then had no where to turn. If truly

powerless, am I to remain a victim to alcohol forever? No, because that is when Step 2 came in and took me on a path to recovery.

Initially, the part about being restored to sanity was bothersome. But as I



looked at behaviors and sacrifices I made in order to continue to drink, it really was a bit crazy. Working extra jobs since college so I would have money to drink. Staying out too late because I was drinking and then having to suffer through the workday until I could go home and sleep or

start drinking again. Hiding behaviors from people that cared about me. Yes, there was some insanity for sure.

I was told to read the book, *Came to Believe*. I started reading stories from people that revealed their personal experiences with spiritual inspiration. Of course, these stories could have been made up to sell the book. But as I read, I started to identify with the people and their feelings. I started to see things differently. A new perspective was developing with less cynicism and more trust. I started to feel better and more peaceful as I relaxed and let go of my defenses.

So now I still believe that a Higher Power can restore me to sanity. I

pray for guidance and protection. I pray for the willingness to believe. I pray for sobriety and for people in my life. I pray for the willingness to want to and to be able to help people. I want to contribute and to make the world a better place now. I still don't understand a Higher Power. But what I understand that when I am willing to beam protection. I pray for the willingness to believe. I pray for sobriety and for people in my life. I pray for the willingness to want to and to be able to help people. My life runs more smoothly. I can manage the hardships with more grace and acceptance.

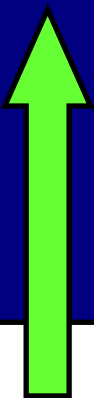

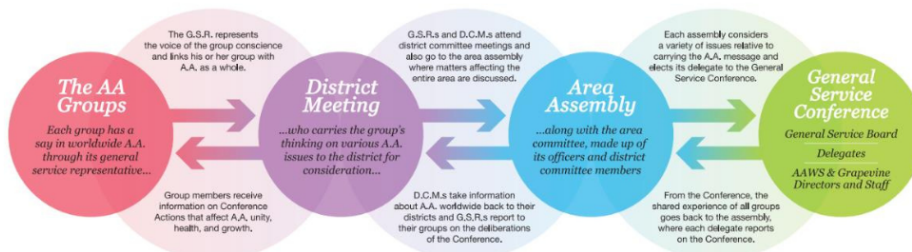

- Collaborate with DCMs, GSRs, and Standing Committee Chairs to hold sharing sessions or service activities that could generate greater interest among A.A. members in serving as GSRs and DCMs and in area positions.



## TRADITION TWO:

**“For our group purpose, there is but one authority- a loving God as he may express himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they don’t govern.”**

Personally, I love how the traditions often expand on the steps.

Tradition2 is no different. First things first, Alcoholics Anonymous does not require our members to believe in God. How is this possible when the word “GOD” is written in this tradition itself?

I have witnessed my fellow AAs “clamor over this and that,” and while I choose to call *my* Higher Power God, I do not wish to debate those with agnostic leanings here.

What I can share, based on my experience in AA, is that our society works exactly as “God” would have it.

To borrow from page 417, in the story “Acceptance”- “nothing, absolutely nothing happens in God’s world by mistake.”

Perhaps Tradition2 is just the right place for unruly, intolerant alcoholics to expand their spiritual consciousness and understanding.

For the alcoholic, it is just that. Acceptance and accepting that despite our differences, there is a common quantum thread that unites us all- whether we like it or not - “...like people on a sinking ship” BB pg 152.

The latter part of the tradition is a wonderful nod to “The Spirit of Rotation.”

Thank God for longtimers who encouraged and lovingly “voluntentold” me to get into service and action.

It’s a funny thing working with others, especially other alcoholics. I am blessed with an overabundance of opportunities to grow spiritually, usually after quite a bit of necessary ego deflation. And AA is a worldclass spiritual classroom.

Working the steps with a sponsor, my life continues to expand as my relationship with a higher power evolves. Symbiotically, the steps also somehow work me in a succinct but not always elegant system of checks and balances- a bone crushing juggernaut that somehow builds character upon an unshakeable foundation.

Despite myself, I am learning to love myself (and others) unconditionally and unapologetically through working with others in Alcoholics Anonymous.

# Traditions Checklist

These questions were originally published in the AA Grapevine in conjunction with a series on the Twelve Traditions that began in November 1969 and ran through September 1971. While they were originally intended primarily for individual use, many AA groups have since used them as a basis for wider discussion.

*Practice These Principles....*

## Tradition 2

“For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern. “

1. Do I criticize or do I trust and support my group officers, AA committees and office workers? Newcomers? Old-timers?
2. Am I absolutely trustworthy, even in secret, with AA Twelfth Step jobs or other AA responsibilities?
3. Do I look for credit in my AA jobs, praise for my AA ideas?
4. Do I often feel the need to "save face" in group discussions, or can I yield in good spirit to the group conscience and work along with it?
5. Although I have been sober a few years, am I still willing to serve my turn with AA chores?
6. Do I complain about the decisions that my group makes, even though I do not attend the business meetings where these decisions are made?

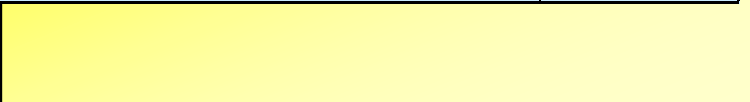
