ROMULUS Pet of the Month FOREVER



Romulus wasn't just a dog who came along—he became part of the fabric of our A.A. community on Maui. He spent many days at Central Office, at Intergroup meetings, steering committees, and supported the day-to-day work of 12 step recovery. Over the years he attended countless meetings and met people from all over the world, offering a calm, friendly presence that brought comfort to many. Romulus was in real service, always showing up steady and kind, wherever the work was happening.

And he was there for the gatherings that stitched our community together—Gratitude Night, Alca-thons, and Intergroup-sponsored events—showing up with that familiar sweetness so many came to recognize. Romulus also joined H&I panels and visits to treatment centers, where a gentle furry face can make the rooms feel a little easier. Last year, he even traveled to the Intergroup Central Offices of Alcoholics Anonymous Seminar in Memphis, carrying that same steady spirit beyond Maui. We're deeply grateful for the love for he shared and the quiet ways he helped people feel welcome.

STEP TWO

Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.

TRADITION TWO

For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern.

CONCEPT TWO

The General Service Conference of A.A. has become, for nearly every practical purpose, the active voice and the effective conscience of our whole society in its world affairs.

**Tradition Two, Interpreted by Someone Who Doesn't Believe in God
(Relax, It's Fine)**

For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience."

As a sober atheist, I read that sentence the way I read IKEA instructions. I don't believe in the tiny Swedish man, but the bookshelf still stands if I follow the logic.

Strip away the theology and the point is beautifully practical: no one person runs the show. Not the loud one. Not the smart one. Not the person with the most sobriety, the fanciest vocabulary, or the strongest opinions about coffee. Authority lives in the group conscience, which is a polite way of saying 'we decide together, slowly, and with fewer egos than usual.'

The Tradition is intentionally short because it's setting a boundary, not writing a manifesto. It says the authority isn't individuals or outside forces. It's the collective wisdom of people who've actually been there, screwed up, stayed sober, and learned a few things the hard way. If you want to call that a Higher Power, go for it. I call it crowd-sourced humility.

The short form adds the helpful clarification that leaders are "trusted servants" who "do not govern," which is AA's way of saying: congratulations on your service position, please do not let it go to your head. No rulers. No executives. No spiritual middle management.

The long form makes one thing very clear: nobody here outranks anyone else. Leadership isn't power, it's a chore with responsibility attached. This setup doesn't assume people are evil. It assumes people are human. And humans, when given unchecked authority, tend to get weird pretty fast.

By keeping authority collective and leadership humble, the Second Tradition protects unity, keeps egos from hijacking the room, and leaves just enough space for recovery to happen. As an atheist, I may skip the God part, but the wisdom? I'm fully on board.

I had the opportunity to stand on the stage at the 2025 International Convention and gain a real-time perspective on the line in Tradition One where it says that “each of us is a small part of a great whole.” While we may each be a small part, each one of us is a vital part.

The future of Alcoholics Anonymous is up to each one of us. Whether A.A. is here in the future for the still-suffering alcoholic will depend upon the efforts of us all.

In the book *Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age*, Bill speaks of what is required of us as A.A. members — a sacrifice of much time and little money. When I look up the word “sacrifice” in the dictionary, it says “giving up something of value for something with a higher calling.” So, a sacrifice of time is not my spare time, because spare time, like spare change, has little value. A sacrifice of time is the time where I might prefer to be doing something else.

Every minute I have had for the past 27 years has been given to me by Alcoholics Anonymous. But for Alcoholics Anonymous, I would not have seen my children finish elementary school, graduate from high school, graduate from university or get married. I would not have seen my grandchildren born. I would not have had the opportunity to laugh and cry with my family and friends. I would not have had the best friend that I do. When I think of the time I give to Alcoholics Anonymous, I must ask myself, as you may ask yourself, am I really making a sacrifice for Alcoholics Anonymous? For me, that one hour where I go to my home group is not a sacrifice. Nor are the two or three or four hours I spend attending other meetings. If I am involved in service outside of my home group, whether that is acting as a General Service Representative, taking a meeting into a hospital or prison, volunteering with a central office or intergroup, or meeting with sponsees, this may be the beginning of a sacrifice. But even if I do that for 10 hours a week, that is less than 6% of my time in a week. Would I gladly give up 6% of my time to spend the other 94% with

my family? Would my family happily give up 6% of my time for another 27 years with me? Would I gladly give up 6% of my time to have this life? Would I happily give up twice that? For me, I would gladly give up much more than that. This life is worth far more than that.

All of the money in my pocket today was earned by me in the last 27 years. A dead man would have no money in his pockets. Everything I have, I owe to Alcoholics Anonymous. When I put money in the basket, I am simply giving back to Alcoholics Anonymous a very small fraction of what Alcoholics Anonymous has given to me. When the basket comes by, or when there is an opportunity to be of service, I ask myself, what am I willing to sacrifice to help save that still suffering alcoholic from dying an alcoholic death? I find I am often not satisfied with my own answer.

What I know is that there are tens of millions of alcoholics who need our help. Am I willing to sacrifice a few things: time, money, my opinions, my need to be right? I ask myself, am I really a different person than I was when I got to Alcoholics Anonymous, or am I still concerned with my own comfort, my own wants and needs or my own decisions about what I must have in order to have a good life? Have I actually achieved any degree of humility? For me, sacrifice has a good deal to do with humility. Again, sometimes I am not happy with my own answer.

If asked, what would I report about the sacrifices that I have been willing to make to help some alcoholic I will never meet avoid being doomed as we once were? What would I report that I have done to help that person be given the opportunity for a new life the way we have been given that opportunity.

APPROVAL OF PRIOR MEETING MINUTES: Motion/Second by Karen (Sober & Crazy)/Ellen (Kihei Morning Serenity) and passed to accept 12/13/25 minutes.

INTERGROUP REPRESENTATIVE GROUP REPORTS:

- Renee (Wailuku Group): No issues.
- Françoise (Sat Night Speakers): Well-attended, could use help with service positions.
- Mateo (Misfit Toys): Attendance has been good; mostly men, but strong members.
- Amy (High in the Sky): All group positions filled; attendance is good.
- Eric (Live in the Solution): All is well.
- Meri-Jo (Upcountry Sunrise): Hosting of the NYE Alkathon went well.
- Loretta (member of Paia Pono): Meeting going well, at 6 pm Thursdays.
- Kevin (449): All is well, usually 10-18 attending.
- Terry (New Awakening): All is well, usually 10-15 attending; need a GSR.
- Karen (Sober & Crazy): Now meeting on Wednesday only; All positions filled except Alt-IG Rep.
- Bonnie (Sisters in Sobriety): All positions filled; attendance is great.
- Michelle (Women’s Way of Life): Meeting now has an Alt IG Rep; still seeking Alt-GSR; all other positions filled.
- Jack (To Thine Own Self Be True): Good attendance, in need of an Alt IG Rep.
- Bill (Maui Sunset): Some open service positions, otherwise all is well.
- Wally (Maui Strong): Attendance is mostly from the sober recovery house; positions are filled.
- Jody (Sober Wahine): They are currently doing a group inventory; attendance is good, and positions are filled.
- Ellen (Kihei Morning Serenity): Attendance is good; positions are filled except Alt IG Rep.

TREASURER’S REPORT- Kevin M: See report for month of December.

- Kevin M gave the Treasurer’s report. Contributions were up for December, and the trustee of Sylvia W’s Estate wired \$12,500 to Intergroup’s bank account in December.
- Motion/Second by Terry (New Awakening)/ Kevin (449) and passed to accept Treasurer’s Report.

OFFICE MANAGER’S REPORT – Regina:

- So far there has been no change in the monthly rent since the building was sold in December. Intergroup paid the usual \$525 rent at the beginning of January.
- The Alano Club of Lahaina is planning to re-open at a new location in Ka’anapali in February.
- Volunteers are needed on Wednesdays & Saturdays (10 am – 1 pm) to work at Central Office, answering phones and providing A.A. literature as needed to groups.
- On February 1st, AA World Services will increase literature costs by about \$3 per book and 15 cents per pamphlet.
- Kevin (449) volunteered to write an article on Step 2 for the Serenity Gazette. Michelle (Women’s Way) will write one on Tradition 2.

STEERING COMMITTEE CHAIR REPORT – Mark:

Mark has not heard back from the new property manager regarding a possible increase in rent and/or a new lease agreement for Central Office. Mark spoke with an on-island commercial realtor who said that the landlord must give 45 days' notice prior to a rent increase for a commercial lease. The \$525/month rent for Central Office is significantly below market.

HAWAII AREA/MAUI DISTRICT/STANDING SERVICE COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Elijah – District 5: 2026 budget approved. They will assist in providing transportation and home stays for the Inform the Delegate Assembly, April 18-19 at Hannibal Tavares Community Center.

OLD BUSINESS:

- Jeanna was elected to fill the vacant position of Secretary of the IG Steering Committee. No further discussion.
- The open budget items have been completed for the 2026 Intergroup budget. No further discussion.
- Bequest of \$600,0000 to Maui Intergroup from the Estate of Sylvia W. See discussion under New Business.

NEW BUSINESS:

There was more discussion of the bequest. The trustee of Sylvia's estate agreed to hold off on distributing any funds beyond the \$12,500 already sent in December until we come to a decision. An IG rep requested that the CO manager bring several copies of The AA pamphlet, "Where Money and Spirituality Mix," to this January IG meeting. He referenced sections of the pamphlet that explain the "self-support" concept of Tradition 7 and the pitfalls of accepting large gifts. Another member of IG said that she called AA General Service Office and asked if Intergroups were bound by GSO's contributions limits. The person at GSO said that Intergroups are free to set their own guidelines for contributions if they wish.

In December, Mark had asked the Intergroup Representatives to take the matter back to their groups for discussion. Some IG reps brought their group conscience back in January, but most did not. Mark asked again for all Intergroup reps to discuss with their groups and bring their group conscience to our February IG meeting.


