Step one

We admitted we were powerless over alcohol — that our lives had become unmanageable

Step 1 stands as the crucial foundation for recovery. This pivotal step marks the beginning of a transformative journey towards sobriety, emphasizing the profound significance the principle of honesty.

At its core, Step 1 demands rigorous honesty from individuals confronting alcohol addiction. The admission of powerlessness is, in essence, an honest reckoning with the reality that the grip of alcohol has become insurmountable. It requires an authentic acknowledgment that attempts to control drinking have failed, shattering the illusion of control over the substance. In this admission, a raw and unfiltered honesty emerges, breaking down the walls of denial and self-deception.

The principle of honesty is woven into the fabric of Step 1, compelling individuals to confront the undeniable truth about the unmanageability of their lives. This unmanageability extends beyond the physical act of drinking, seeping into relationships, professional endeavors, and overall well-being. Honest introspection reveals the havoc wreaked by alcohol, dismantling the façade of a functional life and laying bare the wreckage left in its wake.

Moreover, Step 1 encourages individuals to be honest about the emotional damage of addiction and to acknowledge the pain, remorse, and despair that accompany a life entangled with alcohol. This emotional honesty is a vital catalyst for change, as it motivates individuals to seek liberation from the "chains" of addiction and to begin a journey towards healing.

The honesty embedded in Step 1 leads to the recognition of that lack of power was their dilemma. Admitting powerlessness invites individuals to seek the needed power and engage with the supportive community within AA. This honesty within the group fosters an environment where individuals can share their struggles without judgment, fostering a sense of belonging and understanding.

In conclusion, Alcoholics Anonymous Step 1, with its admission of powerlessness and unmanageability, underscores the transformative power of honesty as a necessary first step. This honesty is a "beacon" guiding individuals out of the shadows of denial and into the light of self-awareness. It is the cornerstone upon which recovery is built, fostering a genuine commitment to change and providing a solid footing for the subsequent steps in the journey towards lasting sobriety.

We freely share our time and talent in an effort to stay sober and carry the message of Alcoholics Anonymous to those who are suffering from alcoholism. In other words, you get what you give.

Getting involved in A.A. service

A.A.'s Twelfth Step suggests that we carry the message of recovery. That is the basic service that A.A. provides. Any action that helps A.A. to function as a whole is service. Most A.A. members start out providing service in their group.

Service in the Group


In A.A., everything starts with the group — it is the place where recovery begins for most alcoholics and is the basic building block of the entire Fellowship. But, for a group to keep going, all kinds of service must be done.

It is through the combined efforts and ongoing commitment of group members that:

- A meeting place is readily available and maintained
- Meetings are arranged for the benefit of the alcoholics in attendance
- Calls for help are answered
- Voluntary contributions are collected to keep the group and the Fellowship going financially.
- Literature is provided for all mem-

bers and ... local group meetings are made available.

- Continuing contact is sustained with the rest of A.A.

TRADITION ONE:

"OUR COMMON WELFARE SHOULD COME FIRST; PERSONAL RECOVERY DEPENDS UPON A.A. UNITY."

When my sponsor first introduced me to the traditions he stated something like this; The Steps keep us from harming ourselves, the Traditions keep us from harming each other.

Whenever I am reading traditions with another alcoholic or discussing traditions in a group I remember that the traditions are guides for the groups. AA does not have any rules, just suggestions and guidelines. I have learned that the results will probably not be good if one does not follow suggestions, an alcoholic who does not work the steps and practice the principles in all our affairs is likely to drink again. A group that does not follow the traditions will eventually cease to exist. So I try my best to take suggestions and follow guidelines.

The traditions have a short form and a long form. Both forms are found in the "Big Book' and in the "Twelve and Twelve." The short form says to me that I must do my best to keep the AA group together. For without the AA group I cannot find the fellowship I need to support my recovery. I need the AA program and the AA fellowship for my personal recovery. I need to actively participate in meetings, not just show up and attend. I must practice the 12 steps daily and incorporate the principles into all of my life. I need to be of service to AA meetings and AA as a whole. I need to work with my sponsor and sponsor other men. I cannot do all these requirements without a healthy AA group holding regular meetings. I need the group, bottom line.

An early form of tradition one is found in Language of the Heart from July 1946. "Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a part of a great whole. AA must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward." This is the long form of tradition one in the Twelve and Twelve.

I enjoy looking at all of the AA literature to try and learn as much as I can about where AA comes from and what it's all about. In this early long form of tradition one I get some information that is not conveyed as strongly in the short form. First is a spiritual idea that we are all part of a great whole. I interpret this as an AA member is part of a group, and the group is part of AA as a whole. I also believe this is a larger concept that is a part of my personal spirituality. My consciousness is a small part of the great universal spirit of God. Through working the steps, I lessen my huge ego to become a child of God and more conscious of God in everything.

The long form reminds me that alcoholism is a fatal illness. Without recovery I will surely die. My life depends on AA unity. Our common welfare comes first.

STEP ONE: We admitted we were powerless over alcohol — that our lives had become unmanageable.

I remember the first time I wrote out my step one. In my writing, I realized it had taken me over a year to fully concede to my innermost self that I was an Alcoholic as described on page 21 of the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous. That innermost feeling came about when I became willing to go to any lengths (*Alcoholic Anonymous pg58*), when, I finally asked the hardest question I have asked in AA, "Will you be my sponsor?" For me, *that* was conceding to my innermost self. I wasn't sure if he would say yes. I was full of fear and self-centered pride at the thought that I, needed someone else's help. That was the beginning of me being honest, which is the principle we learn when truly understanding this step. The writing came when that sponsor insisted I go to a 12-step workshop facilitated by a dude named Colin. Honestly, that workshop taught me the most important thing I do today- any guesses??? It taught me how to sponsor others through the program. Here is how I do that... for Step 1 (short form) ... hahaha.

I ask my man to read every single page to page 43 and then answer some questions, in detail. Before I go over what they have written for Step 1, I pop quiz them on the Preface and the Forwards to see how honest they are, and if they did the reading or not! I lied when I was asked if I first read (supposed to) all of it. Honesty does not come easy when you have been a professional liar for three decades before coming into A.A. (I'm just being honest folks). I also pop quiz to see what they retain. Then, I go over with them, my favorite parts of everything up to page 43. I do a lot of talking at that point (shocking I know). I am passionate about that portion of our book. Sponsors should be passionate and do most of the talking, otherwise, your Sponsee may turn you into a psychologist telling you all of their problems. Honestly!

Here are a few of my favorite questions to have them write on:

- 1. If other people have told you how you have hurt them, then write down what they said.
- 2. Describe any memory lapses where you can't account for where you were and or how you got home—through others telling you what you did.
- 3. Describe incidents where you expressed inappropriate anger towards other people.
- 4. Can you pinpoint one time period in your life when your life began to become extremely unmanageable? If so, describe that period of time and what was happening.
- 5. Is there one final incident or insight that made you realize that your life was unmanageable? If so, describe it in detail.
- 6. Would you hire yourself to manage your life? Consider new management! Can you NOW fully concede to your innermost self?
