# TRADITION SIX:

*"An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property and prestige divert us from our primary purpose."*

In thinking about writing this article on Tradition Six, I remembered that Bill W wrote about the 12 traditions in the Grapevine magazine way back in the early days of Alcoholics Anonymous. When I read Bill's article below, it remains relevant, almost 80 years later!

## **Tradition Six (AA Grapevine, May 1948) from *The Language of the Heart – Bill W's Grapevine Writings* (pages 83-84.)**

*"The sixth of our Twelve Points of AA Tradition is deemed so important that it states at length the relation of the AA movement to money and property.*

*This Tradition declares in substance that the accumulation of money, property, and the unwanted personal authority so often generated by material wealth comprise a cluster of serious hazards against which an AA group must ever be on guard.*

*Tradition Six also enjoins the group never to go into business nor ever to lend the AA name or money credit to any "outside" enterprise, no matter how good. Strongly expressed is the opinion that even clubs should not bear the AA name; that they ought to be separately incorporated and managed by those individual AAs who need or want clubs enough to financially support them.*

*We would thus divide the spiritual from the material, confine the AA movement to its sole aim, and ensure (however wealthy as individuals we may become) that AA itself shall always remain poor. We dare not risk the distractions of corporate wealth. Years of experience have proven these principles beyond doubt. They have become certainties, absolute verities for us.*

*Thank God, we AAs have never yet been caught in the kind of religious or political disputes which embroil the world of today. But we ought to face the fact that we have often quarreled violently about money, property, and the administration thereof. Money, in quantity, has always been a baleful influence in group life. Let a well-meaning donor present an AA group with a sizable sum and we break loose. Nor does trouble abate until that group, as such, somehow disposes of its bankroll. This experience is practically universal. "But," say our friends, "isn't this a confession of weakness? Other organizations do a lot of good with money. Why not AA?"*

*Of course, we of AA would be the first to say that many a fine enterprise does a lot of good with a lot of money. To these efforts, money is usually primary; it is their lifeblood. But money is not the lifeblood of AA. With us, it is very secondary. Even in small quantities, it is scarcely more than a necessary nuisance, something we wish we could do without entirely. Why is that so?*

*We explain this easily enough; we don't need money. The core of our AA procedure is one alcoholic talking to another, whether that be sitting on a curbstone, in a home, or at a meeting. It's the message, not the place; it's the talk, not the alms. That does our work. Just places to meet and talk, that's about all AA needs. Beyond these, a few small offices, a few secretaries at their desks, a few dollars apiece a year, easily met by voluntary contributions."*

Aloha my dear Maui AA fellowship ~

Currently, face to face TTOSBT [To Thine Own Self Be True] is my HG (Home Group). When I arrived Maui 2001, Central Office Manager's name was Bob and UpCountry Women's meeting at Po'okela church was my first Homegroup on island. As a sober newly solo Mama of two, arriving here from NoCal with my old "Blueberry" Volvo wagon and several additional programs along with solid sobriety, we acclimated to Hawaiian life via years of jungle, ocean and homeschooling prioritized just after sobriety.

Having been in service to Maui Central Office over most all these years since then, sometimes in person and sometimes remote, I decided to write Today to share some ES&H [experience, strength, and hope] to encourage more of us to add this AA 12 Step service opportunity to our lives.

Yes, occasionally people call asking for directions or to clarify meeting information or needing assistance on aamaui.org. More frequently, in my experience, are the "one of a kind" calls that represent the reality of the very reason we continue to make this hotline available. The changes in technology over the past 25 years or so are so vast, as many of us know, I could only have kept an accurate tally with pencil and paper and I didn't ~ which is concurrent with everything else about my AA program other than the Steps, Traditions & Concepts of our program.

Not only have I taken calls and spoken with spouses, parents, visitors, Al-Anon's, bewildered drunks, angry alcoholics, frustrated alcoholics, happy alcoholics, appreciative alcoholics ... I have also helped people who have called looking for essential AA material of every kind and sometimes it's available at Central Office, sometimes it's available online ... sometimes the person calling will be requesting guidance about how to have a piece of literature laminated for an AA related event ... sometimes it's the printshop downstairs (below Central Office in Wailuku) and they have accidentally received USPS mail for us and want to know how to make sure we get it, sometimes an event on Maui is in the works and contacts/arrangements need to be made through us (AA Maui Central Office). There is MUCH, MUCH, MORE and the job of our Central Office Manager (the umbrella to all these calls and Phone Angels) is almost unending (which means that person also needs healthy self-care boundaries.)

Please help us help ourselves even if you only cover one shift. Please. It's very rewarding in multiple ways.

It works because we work it. WE>i

# STEP SIX:

"Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character."

The principle of step 6 is WILLINGNESS.

At step 6 I was told by my sponsor that I was ready to look at 'being entirely ready have God remove all my defects of character.'

"What does that mean", I asked myself?

In step 4 I had identified things that had brought me physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual bankruptcy. Things that had been blocking the sunlight of the spirit.

In step 5 I had honestly confided them to God, and to my sponsor.

Now, in step 6, it was time:

to be willing,

to be entirely ready,

to have God remove all these defects of character.

To be willing to recognize my character defects.

To be willing to be entirely ready to let go and let God.

To be willing to participate in my own recovery.

I loved the gentleness of what I was being asked to do ... to simply be willing.

My experience had brought me to a trusting place with the words in the Big Book, the 12 x 12, my sponsor, and other trusted members of our fellowship. They all told me I could do this, if my attempts were honest, if I was willing, and if I took action. It wasn't a theory anymore, it was fact.

I chose to step into willingness and do the next right thing. The plan for me was to be willing, and ready, to do differently.

My sponsor told me to make a list of the opposites of the character defects I'd recognized in step 4 , and spoken about in step 5.

If I would normally lie, I'd be ready tell the truth.

If I would normally interrupt, I'd be ready to shut up and just listen.

If I'd normally be mean,

I'd be ready to say a kind thing, or do a kind action.

I'd act myself into right thinking, and right being!

Prepared with a list of opposites, I was to think of common scenarios that would come up where one of my

character defects was likely to surface.

I was then to picture that same scenario playing out with me doing the opposite better behavior, being the better version of me. Wow, interesting! I really liked the way that felt.

With this “script” tucked into a pocket of my mind and heart, I moved forward, more equipped, more prepared to do differently. When the time arose that bad behavior had an opportunity to play out, I’d reach for a tucked away opposite that I’d decide upon early, and practice doing differently.

It was an effort, but I was told that one day it would not be an effort, and that’s when God has removed it.

All of this willingness to be entirely ready was preparing me for the next call to action, step 7, Humbly asking God to remove my shortcomings.

I had a plan, and practice with, implementing better behaviors that would replace the shortcomings that would be removed.

I was given the opportunity in step 6 to experience and practice willingness. I made the effort to do differently, and today, most of the time, it isn’t an effort at all. Thank you, God!

My world, and the world of those around me, is so much better for me being willing to be entirely ready have God remove my character defects. For that I am so grateful.

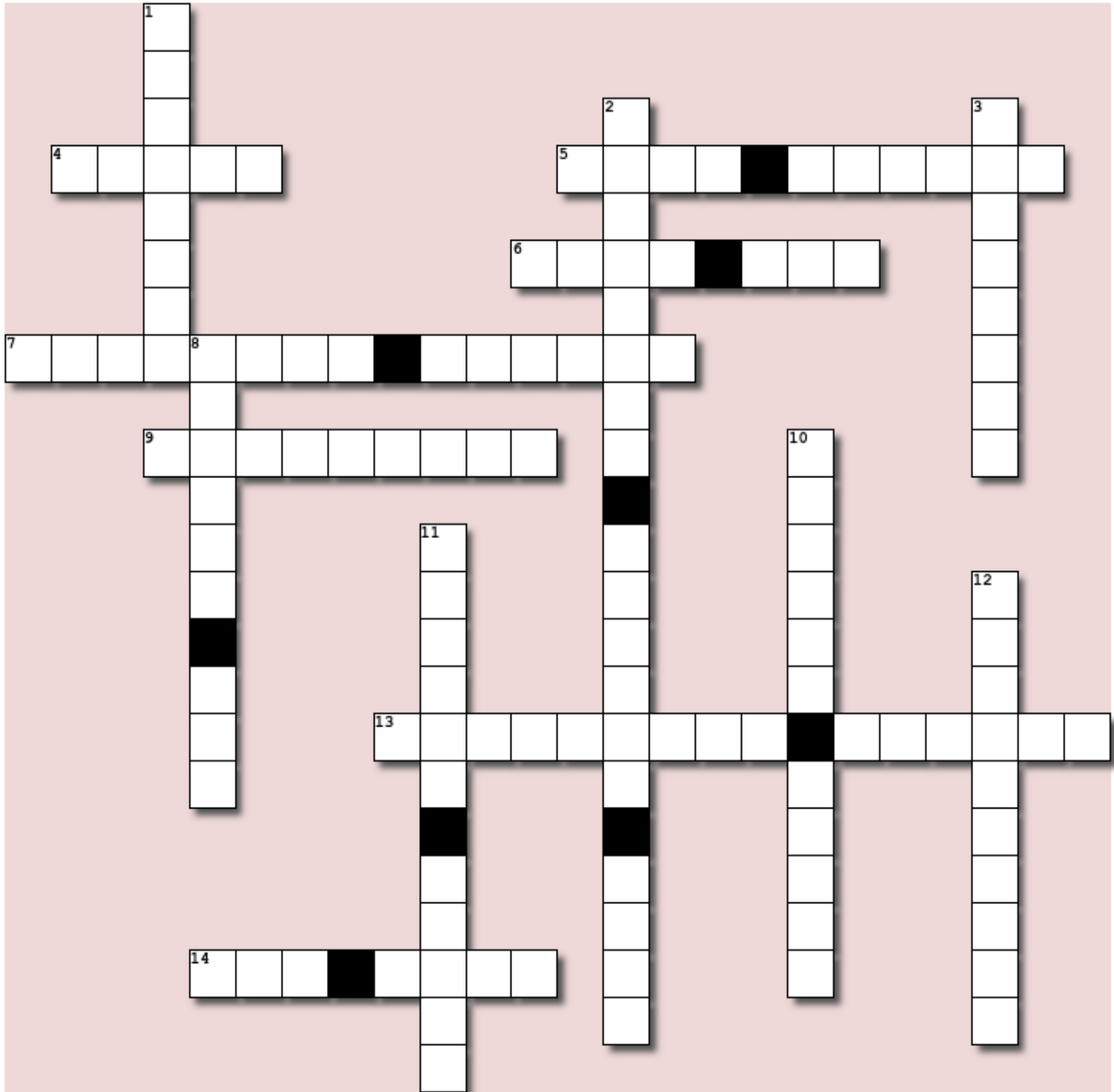

APPROVAL OF PRIOR MONTH’S MEETING MINUTES: Motion/Second by Livit (Women’s AA Way of Life) and Trish (TTOSBT – Zoom) and passed to accept the 4/11/26 minutes.

### INTERGROUP REPRESENTATIVE GROUP REPORTS:

Livit – Women’s AA Way of Life: All is going well; Alt-IG and Alt-GSR positions open; Women from recovery center sometimes attend the meeting.

Bill – Maui Sunset: All is well, still 7 days/wk at Waipulani Park.

Ann – Upcountry Sunrise: The group is considering hosting Gratitude Night.

Trish – TTOSBT Zoom: Meets 6 days/wk on Zoom, 7:30 am. Asked about a QR code for group – discussion followed: since groups don’t have a tax ID number, typically group treasurers use their personal QR codes (Venmo) or Paypal for 7<sup>th</sup> Trad collection, then pay splits w/cash or check. Group is getting more speakers from off-island for variety.

Carl -- Kihei Beach Group: Group meets on grass of Kam III, 9 am Sundays. Maui County will soon restrict parking to residents only until 10 am, so they’ll figure out how to deal with that when it goes into effect (no known start date.)

Jack --To Thine Own Self Be True: Group needs a GSR and permanent IG Rep. Meetings are well-attended.

Mateo – Misfit Toys/Better than Gold: Attendance is good; Groups are at same location and are combined for representation.

Val – Dawn Patrol: Doing well, good attendance, having business meetings.

### OFFICE MANAGER’S REPORT – Michelle (Central Office Manager):

We have an opening for Wednesdays from 10 am to 1 pm so that we can have the office open that day.

Phone coverage is good for now, but we can always use more back-up volunteers.
