Rivers of Recovery on Maui

The Wisdom of the Kūpuna and the Spirit of Recovery

There is something sacred about the rivers and waterfalls of Maui – living beings, not objects. The old ones, the **kūpuna**, would remind us that water – *wai* – is life itself. In ancient Hawai'i, *wai* was also the root of the word *waiwai*, meaning wealth. True abundance was not measured in possessions but in the purity and flow of one's waters – both in the land and within the spirit.

When I sit beside the stream at **ʻĪao Valley**, I can almost hear the voices of the kūpuna carried on the wind: *E mālama i ka wai, no ka mea, 'o ia ke ola* – take care of the water, for it is life. The river that winds through ʻĪao, once the site of great battles and great healing, teaches humility. It reminds us that what is strong can still be gentle. Like the flow through stone, recovery is not about power – it is about patience, trust, and the steady softening of the heart.

At **Twin Falls** on the Road to **Hāna**, I see the lesson of *kuleana* – our responsibility to the ʻāina and to ourselves. The kūpuna say that when we enter such places, we must do so with respect—to ask permission, to tread lightly, to leave no trace but gratitude. In recovery, this is the same as approaching our own healing with reverence. We cleanse ourselves not only for our own good, but to keep our inner river pure for those who come after us.

At **Waimoku Falls** in **Kīpahulu**, the journey through bamboo is like walking through prayer. The kūpuna might say that this is *ka ho'oma'ema'e 'ana* – the cleansing. Every step through the dark and the quiet prepares us for the light that bursts forth at the end. When the waterfall finally comes into view – a 400-foot thread from sky to earth – it feels like *aloha* in motion, unconditional love made visible. We stand at its base and receive what it offers: release, forgiveness, renewal.

Further north, the **Honokōhau Stream** flows unseen for much of its journey, hidden deep within valleys. The kūpuna might see this as *ho'omanawanui* – perseverance. Even when unseen, the stream continues to flow. In recovery, much of our work is like that – quiet, unseen, yet shaping everything. We learn to keep flowing, even when no one is watching, even when the world above is dry. Like a river clearing itself after a storm, Step 10 calls us to daily renewal – to let the debris of ego and resentment drift away so the current can run clear again. The kūpuna would call this *ho'oponopono* – to make right, to restore balance. The paths teach us to stay in right relationship with ourselves and others, to keep our spiritual waters pure.

All waters – from ʻĪao to **Hāna**, from **Honokōhau** to **Ha'ikū** – eventually find their way to the same ocean. The kūpuna would smile and say, *He wa'a he moku, he moku he wa'a* – the canoe is our island, and the island is our canoe. All things are connected. So it is with recovery. Each of us is a river finding our way home to the great ocean of awareness, to *ke kai aloha*, the sea of love that holds us all.

Every morning, **Dawn Patrol** comes together in the shadow of ʻĪao Valley beside the spiritual waters – sharing our truth, our laughter, our pain. Like streams joining at the valley floor, our stories merge and flow stronger together. We remember that recovery is not meant to be walked alone. It is a shared current of grace and courage, guided by something greater than ourselves.

On Maui, the rivers teach us what the kūpuna and the Twelve Steps both knew: healing is not about reaching a destination—it is about harmony, flow, humility, and right relationship with all that is.

When we stand before these waterfalls, hearts open and feet grounded in the ʻāina, we can feel their message ripple through us:

*Let go. Flow with aloha. Care for the water within and around you.
You are already forgiven.*

In today's world, opinions move faster than ever. Social media, 24-hour news, and constant public debate can make it feel impossible not to take a side. Everywhere we look, people are arguing about politics, social issues, and the state of the world. And yet, Tradition Ten stands as a calm reminder — a spiritual anchor — that A.A. was built for one purpose only: to help the still-suffering alcoholic.

This Tradition doesn't tell us not to care about the world; it reminds us not to divide our Fellowship over it. The moment A.A. takes a stance on outside issues, we risk losing unity — and unity is what makes recovery possible. When someone walks through the doors of a meeting, they should find a safe place where they can lay down the burdens of opinion and identity, even for an hour.

Tradition Ten protects that space. It reminds us that our strength lies in what we don't fight about. In an age where outrage often drowns out understanding, the humility and restraint of this Tradition may be more radical — and more necessary — than ever.

By staying focused on our primary purpose and leaving outside controversies outside, we ensure that anyone, no matter their background or beliefs, can find hope and healing within our rooms.
