NEW YEAR, SHARED RESPONSIBILITY



Step One: Admitting What We Don't Control

A Member's Reflection

“We admitted we were powerless over alcohol — that our lives had become unmanageable.”

Step One asks us to admit powerlessness — not just over alcohol, but over outcomes, other people, and the need to be right.

Just as I had to admit I couldn't manage my drinking, I sometimes have to admit I can't manage outcomes in service either.

In service, Step One can be easy to forget. When tension arises, the urge to manage, explain, or control can quietly take over. We may believe we're protecting the fellowship, when in fact we're protecting our own certainty.

Step One reminds me that I don't run A.A. I don't get to control how others receive questions, how quickly clarity arrives, or whether agreement follows inquiry. My responsibility is to show up honestly, speak when needed, and let go of the results.

Admitting powerlessness doesn't mean disengaging. It means participating without attachment. It means trusting that A.A. is bigger than any one voice — including my own.

In that way, Step One supports unity. When I remember what I don't control, I'm more willing to listen, more able to stay present through discomfort, and less tempted to force harmony where honesty is needed.

Tradition One: Unity Is Not Silence

— A Member's Reflection

"Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity."

Tradition One is sometimes misunderstood as a call to keep things smooth. But unity was never meant to mean "don't ask questions." It was meant to protect the fellowship from fragmentation — not from inquiry.

Inquiry is not dissent.

Clarifying process is not disruption.

When service structures rely on interpretation instead of record, narration instead of fact, and unspoken hierarchy instead of shared accountability, unity can quietly erode. What may be intended as clarity can begin to shape outcomes. What may be called experience can begin to function as authority.

If questioning process is seen as disruption, it isn't unity being protected— its hierarchy.

Unity weakens when authority flows from experience or position rather than from informed group conscience.

Over time, professionalism and long service — both valuable in their proper place — can unintentionally create distance between trusted servants and the groups they serve. When that happens, group conscience risks being guided rather than informed.

A.A. was intentionally built to decentralize power. Trusted servants serve; they do not govern, manage, or narrate the fellowship back to itself. Unity is not preserved by avoiding questions, but by ensuring that information is clear, records are accurate, and participation remains open.

Tradition One does not ask for silence in the face of imbalance. It asks us to place our common welfare first — even when that means slowing down, asking hard questions, or sitting with discomfort.

If unity depends on fewer questions, it isn't unity being protected — it's hierarchy.

A.A. survives not because tension is avoided, but because honesty is practiced and relationships are preserved through it.

Unity that can't tolerate inquiry isn't unity— it's control wearing a friendly face.

Tradition One: Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon AA unity.

Traditions Checklist

1. Am I in my group a healing, mending, integrating person, or am I divisive? What about gossip and taking other members' inventories?
2. Am I a peacemaker? Or do I, with pious preludes such as "just for the sake of discussion," plunge into argument?
3. Am I gentle with those who rub me the wrong way, or am I abrasive?
4. Do I make competitive AA remarks, such as comparing one group with another or contrasting AA in one place with AA in another?
5. Do I put down some AA activities as if I were superior for not participating in this or that aspect of AA?
6. Am I informed about AA as a whole? Do I support, in every way I can, AA as a whole, or just the parts I understand and approve of?
7. Am I as considerate of AA members as I want them to be of me?
8. Do I spout platitudes about love while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles with hostility?
9. Do I go to enough AA meetings or read enough AA literature to really keep in touch?
10. Do I share with AA all of me, the bad and the good, accepting as well as giving the help of fellowship?

Concept One: Where Responsibility Lives

— A Member's Reflection

Concept One tells us that the ultimate responsibility and authority for A.A. services rests with the groups.

That sentence is simple — and easy to forget in practice.

In service work, it can be tempting to believe responsibility flows upward, toward committees, officers, or those with experience. But Concept One gently reorients us. Service bodies exist to support the groups, not to direct them or speak on their behalf.

Clarity plays an essential role here. When information is shared plainly and records reflect what actually occurred, groups are better able to participate meaningfully in group conscience. When interpretation replaces record, or when decisions are narrated rather than reported, that participation can quietly narrow.

Concept One does not ask us to distrust service. It asks us to keep it accountable and transparent. Trusted servants serve best when they focus on faithful reporting, open process, and resisting the urge to manage outcomes.

Remembering where responsibility lives helps me stay grounded in service. It reminds me that my role is not to persuade or interpret, but to support the process and trust the fellowship.

The AAWS Board recently recommended that monthly communication be sent regarding matters related to self-support. [This communication is the first in that series.](#)

'We are all going to foot the bill'

I got sober a few days before Christmas in 1986, so I feel especially grateful and reflective this time of year. I am still awed at how miraculously A.A. has worked in my life, even before I walked into my first meeting.

I was desperate, but a bit clueless. I saw a classified ad (and I am showing my age!) in the back of the local paper that said: "Drinking problem? Maybe we can help." That was followed by a listing of meeting times and places in my neighborhood. It would take me a few weeks of white-knuckling it before I went to my first meeting. I was welcomed into a warm room and offered refreshments. And while someone told me I would never have to hurt like this from alcohol again, I couldn't get out of there fast enough.

But my getaway was slowed by a gauntlet of members who handed me A.A. pamphlets and meeting books and encouraged me to stay for the second meeting. It took me a few days to return, but I didn't drink.

As an alcoholic, self-centered in the extreme, I just came to expect that all this help would be there for me. It wasn't until my first business meeting that I realized it was made possible by the money members were putting in the basket. This was my first of many lessons over the years in the power and [impact of self-support](#).

Bill W. wrote of the critical importance of self-support to the Fellowship and the special obligation this tradition asks of members in his October 1967 article "A.A.'s Tradition of Self-Support," which is included in the 2025 International Convention commemorative edition of [Language of the Heart](#).

Every single A.A. service is designed to make more and better Twelfth Step work possible, whether it be a group meeting place, a central or intergroup office to arrange hospitalization and sponsorship, or the world service Headquarters to maintain unity and effectiveness worldwide.

These service agencies are absolutely essential to our continued expansion — to our survival as a Fellowship. Their costs are a collective obligation that rests squarely upon all of us. Our support of services actually amounts to a recognition on our part that A.A. must everywhere function in full strength — and that, under our Tradition of self-support, we are all going to foot the bill.

We all share this responsibility to ensure that A.A. is there for the next person who stumbles into our rooms, as it was for us when we needed the gift of recovery. Bill's recognition that "we are all going to foot the bill" is both our spiritual responsibility and our spiritual heritage.

**Maui AA Intergroup Meeting Summary
December 13, 2025**

CALL TO ORDER: 6:01 pm by Chair Mark with Serenity Prayer, A.A. Preamble, Introductions. 12th Tradition by Wally.

PRESENT: Mark– Chair; Jimmy James– Alt Chair; Kevin M– Treasurer; Regina– Office Manager; Bill– Maui Sunset; Wally– Maui Strong; Trish- TTOSBT Zoom; Jody– Sober Wahine; Kevin– (Acceptance-LGBTQ – formerly Club 449); Val- Dawn Patrol; Karen- Sober & Crazy; Francoise– Saturday Speakers; Bonnie- Sisters in Sobriety; Amy- High in the Sky; Renee- Wailuku Group; Elijah- No Ka Oi; Coleen A (Hawaii Area 17 Past-Delegate); Kevin T (AA member); Jeanna T (AA member.)

APPROVAL OF PRIOR MEETING MINUTES: Motion/Second by Karen/Bonnie and passed to accept 11/8/25 minutes.

INTERGROUP REPRESENTATIVE GROUP REPORTS:

Bill (Maui Sunset): Still meeting 7 days/week; no issues.

Trish (TTOSBT Online): Meets Monday thru Saturday on Zoom; no issues.

Jody (Sober Wahine): Meeting has a new Alt-GSR; all is well.

Kevin (Acceptance/449): 12-15 members plus visitors; no issues.

Val (Dawn Patrol): All is well.

Karen (Sober & Crazy): Now on Wednesday; all service commitments covered except Alt Intergroup Rep.

Francoise (Sat Night Speakers): Well-attended with many newcomers.

Bonnie (Sisters in Sobriety): Secretary and Literature positions are needed; attendance is good.

Amy (High in the Sky): Meeting well-attended.

Wally (Maui Strong): Busloads of recovery people arrive each week to attend the meeting. All is well.

Renee (Wailuku Group): Mostly men in attendance; no issues.

TREASURER’S REPORT- Kevin M: See report for month of November.

- Kevin (Acceptance/449) clarified that the \$525 lease deposit payment is considered an asset, not an expense.
 - Kevin M inventoried the books and pamphlets in the office, arriving at a total cost of \$1746.80.
- Motion/Second (Kevin-Acceptance/449 and Karen) and approved to accept Treasurer’s Report.

OFFICE MANAGER’S REPORT – Regina:

- Hawaii Equity Management, the new management company in place after the recent sale of the building, will soon provide a new lease agreement for Maui Intergroup to consider. It is unknown at this time what will be the new monthly rent, and how long the lease agreement term would be.
- A request was made to provide a questionnaire for groups regarding Intergroup-sponsored events, so that Intergroup and members can see what works well for sponsored events, and what may need improvement.
- Volunteers are needed on Wednesdays & Saturdays (10 am – 1 pm) to work at Central Office, answering phones and providing A.A. literature as needed to groups.

HAWAII AREA/MAUI DISTRICT/STANDING SERVICE COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Elijah – District 5: The meetings in this district need support in carrying the message, especially in Hana and remote areas of East Maui. District 5 is working on providing transportation and home stays for the Area Assembly in April.

STEERING COMMITTEE CHAIR REPORT – Mark:

- Was absent last month (11/8/25) due to illness. Will make an appointment with the new property management company to discuss terms of the new lease - how much and for how long? Will bring the info back to group reps.

OLD BUSINESS:

- How to increase 7th Tradition collections from groups was discussed in October. No new discussion.
- Suggestion to create an “exploratory committee” to research property ownership and funding options, and to consider forming a separate, independent non-profit organization (tentatively called *Friends of Maui Intergroup*)

Foundation) to purchase a building for long-term stability and continuity of Central Office, while honoring AA traditions and autonomy. No further discussion.

NEW BUSINESS:

- We have an AA member (Jeanna) willing to serve the remaining term of the vacant Secretary position who meets the requirements and previously served on Intergroup Steering Committee for several years, including as Secretary. Jeanna has also prepared Maui Intergroup's tax returns, along with bookkeeping/banking support for about ten years. As a non-voting member, Coleen served as a teller for the election and explained the Third Legacy Procedure to the 14 voting members in attendance. Jeanna received 13 "Yes" notes and 1 "No" vote. Jeanna will be our Secretary, and now all five of our Steering Committee positions are filled.
- The proposed budget for 2026 Maui Intergroup was distributed for groups to review, with some expenses still to be discussed by the Steering Committee. We will discuss further at the January Intergroup meeting.
- Bequest from Estate of Sylvia W: Intergroup received notice in May 2025 from the Trustee of the estate that a former Maui resident (later confirmed to be an AA member) had named Maui AA Intergroup as a beneficiary. After various individuals in the will received specific amounts, the remainder would be split evenly between Maui Intergroup and six other nonprofits. The Trustee did not give us an estimate of the amount to be received at that time. The Steering Committee asked Jeanna to be the Trustee's contact for Maui Intergroup in this matter. She sent the Trustee attorney all requested documents over the next few months and informed the Steering Committee of further communication and progress over the following months.

On 12/4/25, Jeanna received an email from the Trustee attorney stating that Maui AA Intergroup was due to receive an initial distribution of \$600,000 from Sylvia's estate. The Bylaws of Maui Intergroup, Section VIII, Finance/Legal state that *"INTERGROUP may accept donations from A.A. members conforming with the A.A. Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous and consistent with GSO Guidelines. INTERGROUP shall not accept the responsibility of, trusteeship for, or enter into the distribution or allocation of any funds set up outside of INTERGROUP."* The 4-member Steering Committee (with the Secretary position vacant) did not achieve a majority vote at its Steering Committee meeting on 12/8/25 agreeing that Maui Intergroup should follow the GSO (General Service Office of AA) limits of \$7,500 per year for a living AA member; \$12,500 one-time bequest from a deceased AA member. Therefore, following the Bylaws of Maui Intergroup, Section IV, Steering Committee, Line E, *"In the case of major decision making in the absence of a regular INTERGROUP meeting, a majority decision of the Steering Committee is required, and such action must be reported at the next INTERGROUP meeting."* Our Bylaws, Sec VII, Policy/Decision Making, also state that *"Matters which relate to policy affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole shall automatically be tabled for thirty days by the President and referred for group conscience."* Mark B asked the Intergroup Representatives to take the matter back to their groups for discussion.

Dear A.A. Friends:

Warm greetings – we hope this letter finds you well.

We are writing to inform you of an upcoming literature price increase affecting our English, Spanish, and French books, booklets, pamphlets, and other literature items. At the December meeting of the A.A. World Services Board, the board approved a price increase of \$3 per item for books and a 15 percent increase for all other literature items, with standard rounding applied.

The new prices will go into effect on February 1, 2026.

For historical perspective, the last price increase occurred in April 2023, and the previous increase was in 2014. As with the 2023 increase, this decision is the result of prudent fiscal planning and the goal of long-range stability. Like organizations everywhere, Alcoholics Anonymous is impacted by current economic changes and challenges. One of the most significant challenges we continue to face, as we did in 2023, is the increasing costs associated with the sale of literature.

It is important to note that before the COVID-19 pandemic, the combined costs of production, materials, warehousing, and shipping—collectively referred to as the cost of goods sold—generally ranged between 31% and 34% of sales. Over the past several years, those costs have fluctuated between 42% and 56% of sales, resulting in an annual revenue loss exceeding \$1.8 million. We do not expect these costs to return to pre-pandemic levels. This impact is especially significant given that the General Service Office is supported through both voluntary contributions and revenue generated from literature sales.

We continue to diligently and carefully monitor and reduce expenses where possible, always mindful of the profound significance of each “nickel in the basket” sent to the General Service Board.

Updated pricing will be reflected in the online store when the increase goes into effect.

- **Books** are defined as any item whose item number begins with **B, SB, or FB**.
 - These items will receive a **\$3 per-item increase**, excluding B-0 (*Alcoholics Anonymous* Facsimile First Printing of the First Edition—recently reduced to a discounted \$2 USD List Price) and B-28 (*A.A. for the Older Alcoholic*).
- **B-0** will remain unchanged and is the only exception to the book price increase.
- **B-28** will receive a **15% price increase**.
- **All other literature items** will receive a **15% price increase**.
- **Literature sets** will reflect a **\$3 increase per book**.

We appreciate your understanding and continued support.
